Henderson Mine and Mill Operations Update - Stuart Teuscher, GM of Henderson

- Our company continues to perform well, despite the challenges that we experience
- Most of the company's growth is the on the copper side of the business
- Our production rates have been consistent
- Targeted 2038 mine life which includes the Northwest panel
- Discussions are underway about the potential for Henderson to move forward with the Northwest panel.
- No major update on mill water treatment plant; most likely to start breaking ground in 2025
- Engineering work is complete, finalizing permits
- Employee headcount remains around 360, but we still have about 50 vacancies and are hiring
- Entry level positions at the mill needed:
 - Diesel Mechanics
 - Industrial Electricians
 - Instrument Electricians
 - Fixed Plant Mechanics

Q: Is there any reason behind the drop in molybdenum pricing?

A: Metal prices are dropping with all the uncertainty around the world. I is not unique to Climax Molybdenum. It is harder to get moly through supply chains and into the hands of our customers. IN addition, the business still feels the affects of the pandemic.


Q: With the demand for all this copper, why is the price also dropping off?

A: 55% of the world's copper is consumed in China. Copper is needed in green energy, but supply and demand have not caught up. Environmental Update

In 2020, the Williams Fork Fire burned right up to the Henderson fence near the portal (where the conveyor belt exits the mountain)


In 2021, Henderson performed an assessment based on the USFS fire risk criteria to determine "at risk" infrastructure.





In 2022, based on the risk assessment, Henderson planned to perform fire mitigation forest thinning and clearing, but needed a location to place the timber

KEMP-BREEZE PROJECT: In collaboration with Colorado Parks and Wildlife, timber products harvested from around the Henderson mill will be donated to the Kemp-Breeze Unit restoration.



Discussion - Kasey Martin, Senior Environmental Engineer

- Colorado Parks and Wildlife has been working on the Kemp-Breeze project for about 10 years.
 Once funding is secured to proceed with the project, logs will be needed
- o Henderson and CPW plan to partner, and Henderson will provide the logs for this project
- CPW plans to put the logs in the river channel to manipulate the flows of the Colorado river and increase / improve fish habitats in the area

WINDY GAP PROJECT: In collaboration with Northern Water (and many others), additional timber products harvested from t Henderson will be donated to the Windy Gap Project:

- o Henderson will also donate trees to Northern Water for the Windy Gap Project
- Henderson will stockpile trees this summer and deliver to the project next summer
- Hoping to improve the Colorado River

- Used an excavator to remove the roots
- Cognizant to leave the area clean
- Working on hauling the trees

Q2 Grievance: Henderson responded to **1** community grievance last quarter regarding dust from the Tailings Storage Facility – **Miguel Hamarat**







- Late snows were melting in late April / May, followed by hot, dry weather and high winds
- o The area dried out fast, before we could apply coherix
- Summer rainfall made it difficult for the coherix to adhere where it would be helpful, but we've taken active measures to mitigate the dust concern

Community Engagement / Development Update

Freeport-McMoRan Formal Engagement Process

Freeport-McMoRan's primary formal stakeholder engagement is conducted through the Community Partnership Panel (CPP) meeting process. CPP meetings occur in Freeport-McMoRan communities and consist of stakeholders who represent a cross-section of the community.

The quarterly stakeholder meetings are designed to:

- Share information and encourage dialogue (questions, concerns, input) about the company's operational activities, including actual or perceived positive or negative impacts, so that we may respond or address
 - i.e: Water Treatment Plant updates include construction, design and permit process, buttressing, biodiversity projects (pollinators and boreal toad conservation), fire mitigation, tailings stewardship, dust mitigation, moly standards in particular focus on the ag standard (aka the cattle study)
- Discuss social issues and related community development needs to support the preparation, navigation or actions needed to address risks to resilience, including eventual transition to a post mining scenario
 - o i.e: Housing, assessments, childcare, broadband, mental health, workforce development initiatives, education support, career-readiness
- Share projects and foster collaboration that leads to successful communities and operating environments
 - o i.e: Leadership for Sustainable Communities Initiative focused on Housing, Clear Creek County Collaborative Care Center, Grand County Housing Assistance Program

- Henderson sponsored and attended many events this summer in Kremmling, Granby, Evergreen, Denver, Leadville and Idaho Springs.
- For the Middle Park Fair and Rodeo this year, Henderson mine and mill elected to match dollar for dollar the original purchase price of any 4-H auctioned animal that gets donated back to the resale. This match will benefit the Middle Park 4-H Council programs and all the kids they serve.

Henderson is developing an internal resource guide for our employees to better connect them with their local communities and available resources. This guide will provide a list of local community support services, vouchers programs, and financial support addressing child care, family services, health care, and housing assistance needs.

Roundtable / Community

- Chuck Harmon (Mayor)
 - Idaho Springs received \$160,000 grant and is working in the county to try and establish a multi-jurisdictional housing development

- Would make the county much more competitive for grant opportunities
- Health and Wellness Center in Idaho Springs hosted Senator Hickenooper. This wouldn't have happened without the support of Henderson
- Mitch Houston Clear Creak Schools Foundation
 - Early childhood education update
 - Made the decision to move forward with an employer-based child care program
 - Have opportunity to use space in Idaho Springs elementary school
- Karen Quanbeck:

 - Focused on building outdoor learning space for young learners
- o Lauren Huber, Executive Director of Destination Granby
 - Starting a DreamBuilders/Thrive class in Granby, in partnership with DiAnn Butler
 - Hoping to grow new businesses in town
- Karen Cameron: Human Resources at Loveland Ski Resort
 - Ski Loveland updated infrastructure
 - Hiring and need people on the weekend
- Clear Creek County Commissioner Sean Wood
 - Senator Hickenlooper was impressed with the Health and Wellness Center
 - Fire mitigation is a priority
 - The county wants to focus on what it can control: education and being prepared for evacuation
 - Want to provide resources for the public to be able to mitigate their own property
 - New(er) county manager and finance director (Brian Bosshardt and Maria Ostrom) have provided fresh eyes and turning over all the rocks with public money
- Clear Creek County Commissioner Randy Wheelock
 - Considered creating a tax for surgical mitigations with how high the risk is but elected not to do that because Clear Creek County wanted to develop the idea more clearly
 - Focusing on a more holistic view of tourism and improved marketing
 - Regional along I-70 corridor, looking at transportation projects, rethinking capacity planning for transportation systems (highway, transit)
- Grand County Commissioner Merrit Linke
 - Grand County formed a regional housing authority (Winter Park, Fraser, Granby) for collaboration amongst the towns; appointed members to the board and is working on the structure
 - Focused on sustainable tourism to address overcrowding and negative impacts of tourism; Grand County doesn't have the infrastructure to manage the high numbers of tourists they see
 - Attended a briefing with Senator Hickenlooper to address fire mitigation issues
 - Senator Bennet attended the celebration for the Windy Gap connection project to improve aquatic life
 - Grand County Government is hiring: looking for private contractors to plow roads this winter
 - Appreciated Middle Park Fair support by Henderson
